COURSE DESCRIPTION

Required of psychology majors and recommended for students in all disciplines interested in understanding and more effectively using APA writing style. An introduction to the effective use and application of APA style for research projects, technical papers, and expository writing in the psychological and behavioral sciences. Combination lecture / lab. Prerequisites: PSY 1010; and ENGL 1010.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

LEARNING GOAL 1: KNOWLEDGE BASE OF PSYCHOLOGY: Demonstrate familiarity with the major concepts, theoretical perspectives, and historical trends in psychology.

- a. Identify the basic components of APA style
- b. Explain (in writing) the methods, results, and conclusions of a data collection project.
- c. Identify and locate relevant journals and databases in psychology

LEARNING GOAL 3: CRITICAL THINKING SKILLS IN PSYCHOLOGY: Respect and use critical and creative thinking, skeptical inquiry, and, when possible, the scientific approach to solve problems related to behavior and mental processes.

- a. Discern difference between personal views and scientific evidence in understanding behavior
- b. State connections between diverse facts and theories

Quizzes: 25

All your quizzes will require a proctor. For your proctored quizzes, you will be required to show a driver's license or alternative form of identification. You will be required to find and report who will be your proctor a week before the due date of the quiz which needs to be proctored. A link to the proctor request form will be posted on the module for when it needs to be completed (refer to proctor guidelines). If you plan on taking the quizzes at Dixie's testing center in St George or Hurricane you will not need to use the proctor request form. If you have computer problems while taking a proctored quiz, I can more easily allow you to try the quiz again for full credit if you take it at the testing center. Quizzes cannot be completed after the deadline or made up. Please plan ahead.

There will be five quizzes each worth 5 points. Quiz material will come from the lecturers, readings and practice worksheets. You will be able to use your book and notes for the quizzes, but if you have not reviewed your book and practice assignments, you will most likely not be able to complete the quizzes in the time given.

Introduction: 10

Methods: 10

Results & Discussion: 10

Abstract and Title page: 5

Final Paper: 30

A Rubric for how each assignment will be graded will be provided in each assignment on Canvas.

You will conduct a full research study as part of this class. To conduct some research IRB approval has to be received. For this reason I have listed topics you could do which would not require IRB approval. Please consider the following topics for your project. If you have other ideas please email me and we can

consider your ideas for your project. The topics that do not require IRB are studies involving you, close friends, or members of this class that do not involve any sensitive topics. Examples include:

Behavior change projects/interventions (exercising more, studying better, improving language/communication, compliance training, giving more compliments, serving more, going on more dates, starting a budget etc.).

If you still wish to do a survey, you can, but you will need to get IRB approval (I will help you do this if your project requires it).

Late/Missed Assignments: Assignments must be turned in on the day they are due. Late assignments will be docked by 10% every class period they are late.
