Course Description:

This course examines the “problems” of our world as social constructions. There will be an investigation of the processes by which activists, experts, and the media make claims about what they perceive as injustices and inequalities in their worlds’.

Consideration of current social problems, such as family stability, racism, sexism, poverty, crime, globalization, and ecological problems using sociological theory and empirical studies. Analysis of structural factors underlying these problems and potential solutions will be explored.

Prerequisite: SOC 1010 is suggested but not required.

Course Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course the student should be able to:

1. Cultivate a “sociological imagination.”
2. Assess the underlying causes of social problems.
3. Identify the theoretical frameworks used in the analysis of current social problems, i.e. functionalist, conflict, feminist, and/or interactionist perspectives.
4. Explore social indicators to determine the prevalence of social problems.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of the sociology of social problems as a scientific discipline i.e. the

- gathering of and analyzing of empirical data in a systematic prescribed fashion.
6. Explain the role of institutions in the creation and/or resolution of various social problems.
 7. Demonstrate an understanding of the ideas, people, and events that are generally thought to be important by sociologists of social problems.
 8. Investigate perceived inequality associated with social class, race, ethnicity, gender or sexual orientation.
 9. Examine potential solutions to identified social issues.

Method of Instruction: lecture, group discussions, quizzing, group work, videos.
(Any combination or all of the above methodologies)

Faculty/Student Responsibilities:

1. As a college student, you are expected to schedule at least two hours of study time outside of class for **each** hour the class meets. (minimum of 6 hours per week)
2. Each student is responsible for reading the text plus supplemental Learning Activities (CANVAS) and **not** relying entirely on the instructor presenting every detail.

Understanding of course material will be determined by quizzes, discussion board assignments, mid-term exam, final exam and a position (research) paper. **Extra Credit work is not available in this course.**

Assessment:

Quizzes, Discussion Board Assignments with Peer Appraisals (CANVAS), Mid Term Exam, Position Paper, and the Final Exam.
