The Course:

Sociology is the study of human social interaction and structure. Psychology is the study of individuals and individual behavior. Social Psychology, then, is the study of individual behaviors, their relationships to social interaction and structure, and the influences of interaction and structure on individual behavior. We will see that social psychologists go about understanding behaviors in a systematic fashion via empirical observations - they are scientists. By the end of the course you will have an understanding of people as symbol using creatures with selves, of symbols as the creations of humans with each other, and of society as the result of a multitude of meaningful human interactions.

Course Objectives:

Students completing social psychology should:

- demonstrate an ability to identify the ideas, people, and events that are generally thought to be important by social psychologists;
- demonstrate an understanding of social psychology as a scientific discipline (i.e. the gathering and analyzing of empirical data in a systematic fashion);
- demonstrate an understanding of symbolic interactionism as a major theoretical perspective of a sociological social psychology;
- demonstrate an understanding of objects, symbols, self, mind, and society as the major concepts used by symbolic interactionists for understanding human behaviors;
- demonstrate and ability to apply the above symbolic interactionist concepts to specific empirical arenas.

Evaluation:

Grades will be based on four Field Essays and three Content Essays. Each essay will be worth roughly 14% of your final grade.

Field Essays:

You will write four Field Essays in which you will apply concepts from our readings and class discussions to observations you make of a specific interactional arena. I will make available a Field Essay assignment on January 15; your essays are due in class on January 31, February 28, April 2, and April 25.

LATE ESSAYS WILL BE MARKED DOWN ONE FULL GRADE.

Content Essays:

You will write three Content Essays based exclusively on concepts from our readings and class discussions. I will make available Content Essay assignments on January 31, March 7, and April 16. Essays are due on February 8, March 22, and April 23.

Attendance is not mandatory, though expected. I lecture on material not from the texts. There will be elements of the essays that are not from the texts. If you miss class you risk missing information important for the essays.

ANOTHER NOTE: You must complete all essays to pass this class.
